It's the work of bringing municipalities together to:

- Make smart decisions about where and how growth happens.
- Provide essential services like water, wastewater, and roads.
- Protect our vital farmland and natural areas.
- Coordinate applications for provincial and federal funding.
- Give investors and builders confidence that our region is ready for growth.
- Protect local autonomy while ensuring we are all pulling in the same direction.



# Where Things Stand:

In 2024, the Board of the Capital Planning Region, operating as the Winnipeg Metropolitan Region (WMR), decided not to move forward with Plan20-50, a regional plan developed between 2019 and 2024. The Board recognized that a different approach was needed, one that better reflects today's priorities and tomorrow's opportunities.

In early 2025, a renewed regional planning process began, grounded in municipal and regional needs and aligned with provincial requirements. Work is now underway to reach out to engage a broad range of perspectives to shape our strategic plan in a way that reflects the communities and people that make up this region.
